BORN December 14, 1884, at Watford, England son of John and Anne (Graham) Weall; married Mary Ida Reece, at Westgate-on-Sea, England; children, Hazel Mary, June Rosemary, and Stella Reece Weall: Member, Victoria Masonic Lodge No. 1026, at Hongkong: Clubs, Shanghai, Hongkong, Thatched House of London, etc. etc.

Associated with one house throughout his entire business career, a period of thirty years, successive promotions brought Mr. Weall to his present position as Director of Dodwell & Co., Ltd., general merchants, shipping and insurance agents, in executive charge of the Shanghai offices. He joined the London office of Dodwell & Co., Ltd., in 1902, following his education at Aldenham School, and first came out to China in April, 1904, as a junior assistant with that firm in Hongkong, where he remained for a number of years before being transferred to Shanghai.

BORN November 28, 1873, at Freudenstadt in Germany; married Emma Schmidt, August 27, 1910; one son. Mr. Weber is a member of the German Club, German Garden Club; Vice President, German Chamber of Commerce of Shanghai.

Connected with the dyes and chemical industries for thirty-two years, with long experience in the export department, Mr. Weber's work has taken him all over the world, in many positions of trust and responsibility. He came to China in 1926.

Before joining the dyes and chemical industry Mr. Weber, for gathering commercial information, stayed in different European countries, being connected with various branches of commerce.

Now an active Director of Boyd & Co., Ltd., importers, exporters and insurance agents, Mr. Whitfield had wide business experience before coming to Shanghai, where he has made his headquarters for the past several years. He was Proprietor of P. S. Whitfield & Co., at Amoy, 1922; General Manager of the Ta Chung S. S. Co., Ltd., Amoy, 1928; Director, Amoy Motor Sales, Amoy, 1931, and Director of Harvie, Cooke & Co., Ltd., of Shanghai, 1932. Dr. Wilhelm remained to practice his profession, the law, in Shanghai. He is now a member of the law firm of Musso, Fischer & Wilhelm. He was educated at the universities of Prague, Vienna, and Innsbruck, obtaining the degree of Doctor of Law.

During the World War, 1914-18, Dr. Wilhelm served with the 2nd. Regiment Tiroler Kaiserjaeger in Galicia and Ukraina.

Wilson, Dr. Eric Randolph: *President, American Hospital & Clinic Association.*

BORN June 13, 1889, in Kansas City, Missouri, U.S.A., son of Edwin E. Wilson and Sally (Halderman) Wilson, now the wife of Major R. L. Moore of Londonderry, Ireland; first marriage, Grace Loney, of Moscow, Idaho, 1910; second marriage, Pearl White Chertok, 1930; daughter, Dorothy, wife of James Murphy McHenry of Los Angeles, owner, editor and publisher of the West Hollywood Enterprise and Los Angeles Plain Talk: Member, Jonathan and Hollywood Country Clubs of Los Angeles, Southern California Yacht Club; Chairman Board of Governors, Sea Breeze Beach Club.

Dr. Wilson was educated at St. Andrew's Preparatory School, Eastbourne, Sussex, England; Charterhouse Public School, Godalming, Surrey, England; Franklin College, Dresden, Germany, and the University of Southern California at Los Angeles, where he obtained his A.B., M.S., and M.D. degrees.

He was engaged in practice in Shanghai, 1922-23, but returned to America and ten years later, when on a world tour, decided to remain in Shanghai, establishing the American Hospital & Clinic Association in November, 1932. His professional experience has been broad and varied. He was Consulting Pathologist of the U.S. Veterans Bureau of Southern California; President, Drs. Grant & Wilson, Inc., Los Angeles, and Staff Physician and Lecturer at the Clara Barton, French, California and Angeles hospitals, of Los Angeles. Wilson, George Leopold: *Architect and Surveyor; Partner, Palmer & Turner.*

MR. Wilson was born in London, November 1, 1880, and was educated in that city, serving articles and passing the Professional Associate and Fellowship examinations of the Surveyors' Institute in 1904 and 1905, respectively. He is a Fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects, Chartered Architect, Fellow of the Surveyors' Institute, and a Chartered Surveyor.

In 1908 Mr. Wilson arrived in Hongkong to join Messrs. Palmer & Turner, Architects and Surveyors, as Assistant Architect, and four years later, in 1912, came to Shanghai with Lt. Col. M. H. Logan and opened an office for the firm here. The first commission in Shanghai was the Union Building for the Union Insurance Society of Canton and this was the first steel frame building erected in Shanghai.

Other important buildings followed, including the Hongkong & Shanghai Bank, Customs House, Chartered Bank of India, Australia & China; Yokohama Specie Bank, Yangtze Insurance Building, Glen Line Building, Cathay Hotel and Sassoon House, the foregoing all on the Shanghai water front; Cathay Mansions, International Recreation Club Building, International Recreation Club Race Stands at Kiangwan, Wing On Store, Metropole Hotel, Hamilton House, Embankment Building, Royal Asiatic Society, Wayfoong House, Samarkand Apartments, The Cloisters, Cavendish Court, Grosvenor House, and, in addition, many houses, cotton mills and other industrial buildings.

The firm are now engaged on the design of the new head office for the Hongkong & Shanghai Banking Corporation in Hongkong.

On two occasions Mr. Wilson was elected a Member of the Land Commission in Shanghai, was elected Chairman of the Shanghai Land Valuers Society and officiated for two years, and served on the Shanghai Municipal Council Economy Committee. For many years an active member of the Council of the Royal Asiatic Society, he was Chairman of the Building Sub-Committee and largely responsible for the collection of funds to erect the new building.

Mr. Wilson's clubs are the Thatched House of London and, in Shanghai, the Country, Shanghai, Cercle Sportif Francais, Union Club of China (President several years), Huih Country (Member of Committee), Shanghai Race, Shanghai Polo (Served on Committee), Hungjao Golf, and Shanghai Paper Hunt (Steward for several years).

Winkler, Francis Xavier: *Consul General for Austria; Manager China Branch, Bohler Bros. & Co., Ltd.*

BORN December 23, 1872, at Trieste, son of the late Anton Winkler, a staff officer of the Austrian Navy, and Marie Prunner von Prunnberg; married Vally Stefan in Linz, November 15, 1903; member, Shanghai Rotary Club.

As a naval officer and consular official, Mr. Winkler has been in the service of his native country for more than forty years, in latter years combining government work with commercial interests. Educated at the Export Academy, Vienna, he was in the Austrian navy from 1890 until 1903, and made his first visit to China in March, 1892, on a training ship. He was private secretary to the Governor of Upper Austria, 1903-06, and from the latter until 1923 was in the Austrian consular service, variously stationed at Hongkong, Shanghai, Breslau, Vienna (Foreign Office), Rome, Brindisi, Ancona, Venice and Trieste.

Returning to Shanghai in 1924 as manager of the China Branch of Bohler Bros. & Co., Ltd., steel founders and manufacturers of tool steel, he was then made Honorary Consul for Austria and later came his appointment as Consul General. Mr. Winkler served in Chinese waters during the Boxer uprising of 1900 on the Austro-Hungarian cruiser "Zenta." He was a private in the Austrian Company, Shanghai Volunteer Corps, 1914-15. Mr. Winkler retired in 1932 and left Shanghai, returning to Europe.

Wong, Dr. Benjamin Kay: *Doctor of Dental Surgery; Dean, Shanghai Dental College.*

BORN October 10, 1891, at Victoria, British Columbia, Canada, son of Wong Sing Hoy and Tom Shee; married Gladys Bing Kee Mah at Nanaimo, British Columbia, August 14, 1914 (Mrs. Wong died in Shanghai, September 14, 1928); married Selma F. James of Minneapolis, Minnesota, U.S.A., at Shanghai, November 30, 1929; children, Gladys, born May 22, 1915; Benjamin, Jr., November 19, 1920, and Joffre Kay Wong, April 18, 1922: Member, Awakening Lion Fraternity, Illini Club of Chicago, Ill.; Cosmopolitan Club, Chicago; Chicago Dental Society, Illinois State Dental Society, American Dental Association, 7th. International Dental Congress, Fellow of International College of Dentists, American University and Shanghai Rotary clubs, Shanghai; Shanghai Dental Society (First President), Amity Lodge No. 106, F. & A. Masons.

Well established in the practice of his profession in Chicago, Dr. Wong came to China in April, 1927, because of the urgings of friends who stressed the need of the country for more college trained dentists and a greater knowledge of

dental hygiene. He is now a prominent figure in his profession in Shanghai, both in public life and as a private practitioner. He has been Dean of the Shanghai Dental College since 1930, is a dental surgeon in the health department of Greater Shanghai and Chairman of the Board of Dental Examiners for the health department of Greater Shanghai.

Educated at the Victoria High School, Valparaiso University, Lewis Institute, and the University of Illinois, College of Dentistry, where he was awarded his D.D.S. degree in June, 1922, Dr. Wong was licensed by the state of Illinois the same month and practiced in Chicago until his removal to Shanghai.

Wong, Thomas Goon: *Managing Director, China A. B. C. Underwear Dyeing & Weaving Mill.*

BORN December 8, 1881, in Hoy Ping District, Canton; son of D. C. and Woo Wong; married Miss K. N. Woo in Hoy Ping District, Canton, October 15, 1898; children, James Y. Wong, who is Assistant Manager and Engineer of the China A.B.C. Mill and a graduate of the New Bedford, U.S.A. Textile School and was a special student in the Harvard Business School; two sons in St. John's School, a daughter in St. Mary's School, and two sons at home with their parents. Mr. Wong is a member of the Canton Guild, in which he has served on the Executive Committee since 1920; Cantonese Club, of which he was Vice Chairman in 1931; Nanking Road Street Union, of which he is a member of the Executive Committee; Chinese Merchants' Association, former member of its Executive Committee; Native Goods Association and member of its Executive Committee and a member of the Executive Committee Cantonese Hospital.

Mr. Wong knows the textile industry thoroughly as a result of wide and long actual personal experience combined with the valuable technical training which he secured in the New Bedford Textile School, U.S.A., from which he was graduated in 1915.

He returned from the United States to China in 1917, and became textile engineer for Andersen, Meyer & Co., Ltd.; he was Chief Engineer of Pao Sheng Spinning and Weaving Mill, 1919-20, and Chief Engineer and Factory Manager of Tung Yat Spinning & Weaving Mill, 1920-23.

It was in 1920 that Mr. Wong started the China A.B.C. Underwear, Dyeing & Weaving Mill with ten looms and a few sewing machines. In 1922 fifteen more looms were added. He reorganized in 1924, adding twenty-five looms and 200 sewing machines and six automatic cutters. There were added to the plant in 1929, 300 looms and two slashers, and additional buildings were erected. Two years

later a dyeing and bleaching department was established so that the plant is now a combination of three factories, viz: underwear, dyeing and bleaching, and weaving. The factory building is on Connaught Road and the company gives employment to a total of about 1400 workers. It has a store on Nanking Road for its retail and wholesale business.

Since the establishment of the enterprise a dozen years ago, Mr. Wong has been its General Manager.

Wong-To On: *General Manager, The Great China Co., Ltd.*

BORN at Taiping, Kwangtung Province, China, in August, 1900, son of the Rev. Wong Oi Tong; married Miss Cheng Kwai Mui at Hongkong in 1925; four children, two sons and two daughters: Member, Shanghai Bankers' Club and International Recreation Club; Honorary President, Ching Wu Recreation Club; member, Executive Committee of Overseas Union.

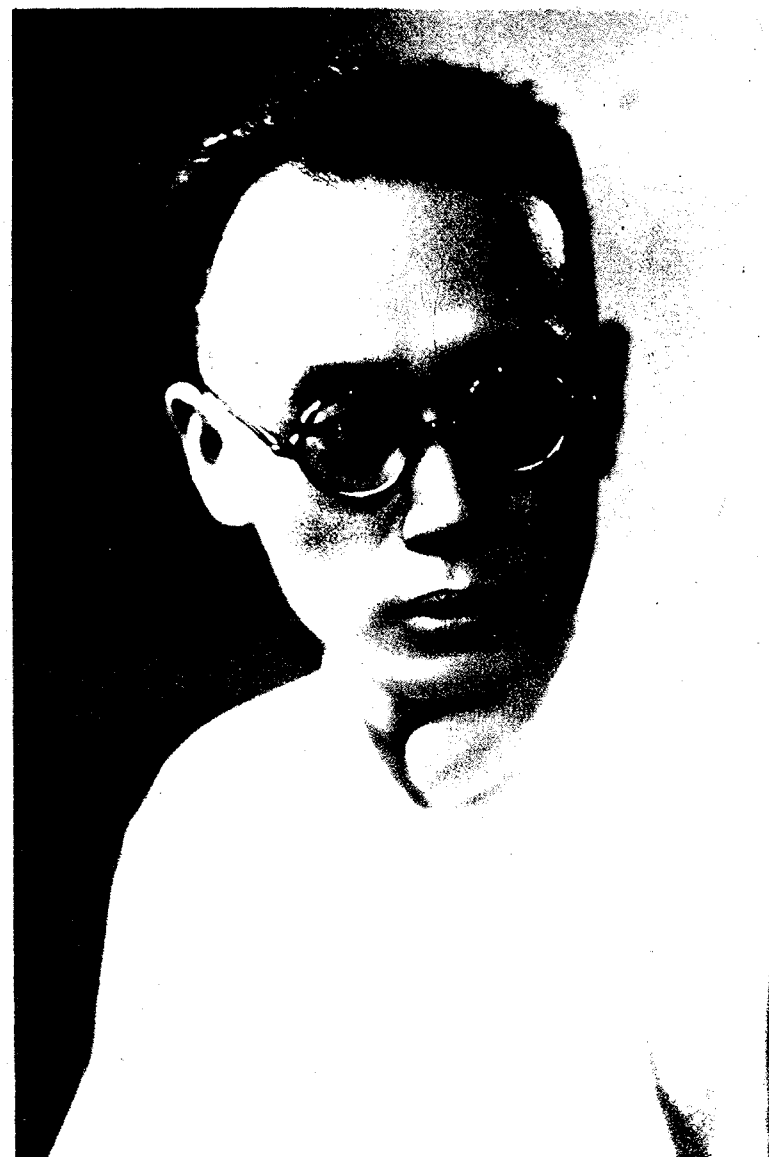
Mr. Wong was educated at Queen's College, Hongkong, and Hongkong University, where he was graduated in 1920 with a B.A. degree in Arts and Commerce. While still a student he taught at St. Paul's College and also did tutoring at Hongkong University, and for two years after his graduation, 1920-22, he was Resident Master at St. Stephen's College, Hongkong.

Entering the business world, Mr. Wong was Secretary of the Sun Co., Ltd., at Hongkong, 1922-26, and since 1927 he has been General Manager of the Great China Co., Ltd., universal providers, importers and exporters, and now has his headquarters in Shanghai. His firm is one of the largest in its field. Active in welfare work, Mr. Wong is a former President of the Christian Endeavour Society, a former Director of the Y.M.C.A. (Junior Division), and a former member of the Executive Committee of the Rhenish Mission Church, all of Hongkong, and has also served as President of the Tung Kung Overseas Union in Shanghai.

Wong Yue Seng: *Chairman and Manager, Shanghai Silk Industry Commercial & Savings Bank, Ltd.*

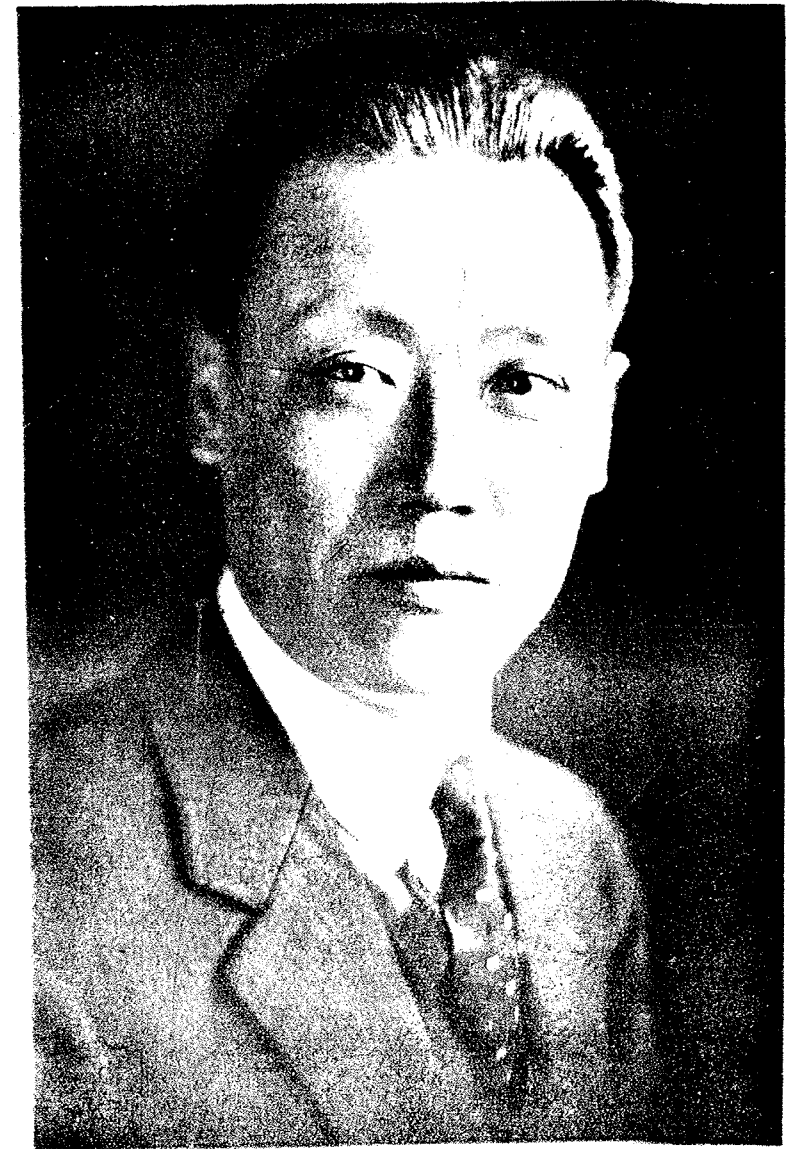
BORN September 22 of the 24th. year of Kwang See at Wong Sha Village of Shan Yui City, Chekiang Province; married; one son; brother, Wong Yue Kong.

One of the leaders of Shanghai's great silk trade, Mr. Wong Yue Seng, besides being Chairman of the Board of Directors and Manager of the Shanghai Silk Industry Commercial & Savings Bank, Ltd., a most important financial institution, is also Manager of the Ta Sing Silk Company and the Wah Wah Silk Company.

Mr. Wong has been a prominent and active figure in government and civic affairs. He has served as a committee member of the Kuomintang, a Councillor of the Municipality of Greater Shanghai, a member of the executive and finance committees of the Municipality of Greater Shanghai and a member of the supervisory committee of the Shanghai Chamber of Commerce.

Maintaining his interest in public affairs, in the conduct of which his advice is frequently sought, Mr. Wong at the present time is Secretary of the Finance Department of the Central Political Association, a member of the temporary advisory committee of the Municipality of Greater Shanghai, member of the standing committee of the Shanghai Chamber of Commerce, Trustee of the Nantao Volunteer Corps and a member of the Executive Committee of the Chinese Ratepayers' Association. He is a member and a liberal supporter of many public and charitable organizations.

Mr. Wong was educated at the Shanghai Commercial University.

Woo, C. T. (Woo Chi Ting): *Banker; Chairman, Kiangsu-Chekiang Commercial & Savings Bank, Ltd.*

BORN August 16, 1892, in Ningpo, son of Woo Chu Yee (deceased) and Woo Wang Tge; married Miss Tei, 1916; two sons, Wou Peh Cheng and Peh Yu: Member and Steward of Shanghai Chinese Jockey Club and International Recreation Club; member of Husi Country Club and St. John's Club.

A division of endeavor between public service and the banking business has thus far marked the career of Mr. Woo. He was a student at St. John's University, Shanghai, and then went to the United States to complete his higher education at Ohio Northern University, where he graduated in 1915. Upon his return to China he was employed as Assistant Manager of the Union Bank, a position he retained for three years. In 1922 he entered the government service at Canton as Director of the Transportation Bureau.

Coming to Shanghai in 1925 Mr. Woo for several months was Director of the Roll Tobacco Tax Bureau and then was appointed Director of Government Lands in Kiangsu Province. At the present time he still holds public office as Director of the Wine and Tobacco Tax Bureau of Chekiang Province.

Mr. Woo joined the Kiangsu-Chekiang Commercial & Savings Bank, Ltd., in 1931 and is now Chairman of the Board of Directors of that important financial institution. In addition to this responsible post he is also a director of the China Development Bank, Ltd., the Dah La Bank, Ming Fong Paper Factory of Kashing and the Wa Fong Paper Factory of Hungchow. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of Ching Hsu College.

Woo, T. D.: *Manager Treasury Department, Central Bank of China.*

MR. T. D. Woo, Manager of the Treasury Department of the Central Bank of China, is a leading Chinese banker and holds an important position in the business community of Shanghai.

Mr. Woo was born in Ningpo on October 7, 1887, of a well-known family. He was educated at Nanyang University, China, and Birmingham University, England. At the latter institution, he was graduated with the degree of Master of Commerce. He did research work at the University of Manchester.

On returning to China in 1913, he became Professor of Economics at the Chekiang College of Political Science, Hangchow. He was concurrently Professor of Business Administration in the Provincial College of Commerce in the same city. He was engaged in educational work for seven years, and left the Chekiang schools in 1919 to join the National Commercial Bank, Shanghai, as Sub-Manager and later as Chief of the Credit Information Department. Thus began his banking career. In the following year he joined the Bank of Communications as Assistant Chief of the Foreign Exchange Department of the Head Office. In 1922 he became Sub-Manager of the Bank of Communications, Shanghai branch. Here an opportunity was offered to him to put into practice his conceptions of modern banking. He instituted reforms in the working of the bank, introduced up-to-date methods and inaugurated new policies in the banking operations. In 1927 he was promoted to Manager of the Shanghai branch. During that year, the banks at Shanghai faced a series of crises due to the repercussions of political storms raging all over the country, culminating in the dramatic march of the Kuomintang armies from Kwangtung northward into the Yangtse Valley and the downfall of the Peking Government. By the masterly manner in which he handled the delicate situation, Mr. Woo successfully maneuvered his bank through the crises with great credit. In the Autumn of 1928, a new charter was obtained from the National Government at Nanking granting to the Bank of Communications the privileges of an industrial bank. Following the re-organisation of the bank's administration, Mr. Woo was appointed General Manager.

In April, 1933, Mr. Woo was appointed to his present position as Manager of the Treasury Department of the Central Bank of China, and at the same time was elected to the Board of Directors of the Bank of Communications.

Besides the work in his own bank, Mr. Woo is pressed with the demands of public service and social activities. He devotes much of his time and interest to educational and public welfare work. He likes to assist in the promotion of native industrial projects. It is in the field of Sino-foreign joint enterprises that his counsels and co-operation are much sought after.

Mr. Woo was elected Councillor of the Shanghai Municipal Council in 1930 and was re-elected to the same post in 1932. He holds concurrently the following

offices: Director of the China Development Bank, Director of the Shanghai Municipal Bank, Director of the China Broadcasting Company, Director of Great China University, Director of the Shanghai College of Law, Supervisor of the China State Bank, Executive Officer of the Shanghai Bankers' Association, Chinese Member of the Association of Shanghai Banks, Member of the Standing Committee of the Joint Reserve Board of the Shanghai Bankers' Association, and Director of the Ningpo Cotton Exchange.

Woo, Dr. Shutai T.: *Physician.*

BORN December 21, 1882, at Soochow City, Kiangsu, son of Woo Wai-chen and Loo Chin-ken; married Miss Rose Wei-hwa Yip in Shanghai, October 16, 1923; children, Robert Kuo-tau, Ruth Kuo-chen, June Kuo-Ling, and Jean Kuo-Yu Woo: Member of the Massachusetts Medical Society, American Medical Association, China Medical Association, Society for Experimental Medicine and Biology, Science Society of China and Society of Micro-biology.

Dr. Woo was educated in Futan College, Kiangsu Provincial College, Harvard Medical School of China, Shanghai; and Harvard Medical School, Boston, Mass., U.S.A., from which he obtained his M.D. degree in 1919. Following his graduation from Harvard Medical School, he served medical internship in the Massachusetts General Hospital at Boston, was assistant Resident Physician at the Consumptives Hospital at Boston and held the Coolidge fellowship for medical research at the Presbyterian Hospital, New York City.

Returning to China in 1922 he joined the staff of the Peking Union Medical College, his connection lasting nine years, during which he was associate and assistant Professor of Medicine, specializing in Infectious Diseases and Hypersensitiveness. During a year's furlough, 1927-28, he again visited America for medical research work in Johns Hopkins Hospital at Baltimore.

Dr. Woo started private practice in Shanghai in the Autumn of 1931, and, concurrently, is assistant Professor of Medicine in the National Medical College of Shanghai and visiting physician at the Red Cross General Hospital, the teaching hospital of the National Medical College of Shanghai. He has published numbers of scientific papers dealing chiefly with those subjects in which he has largely specialized in his studies and research work.

Woodhead, Henry George Wandesford: *Journalist; Editor of China Year Book.*

BORN November 27, 1883, in Devonport, England, son of Lieut. Thomas Wandesford Woodhead, R.N., and Jessie Leith (Weir) Woodhead; married Miss

Florence Louise Hamlin in Shanghai, September 30, 1908; five children, Miss Eileen Florence Emily, now in the London office of the Asiatic Petroleum Co., and Wandesford Woodhead, employed in Jardine, Matheson & Co., Ltd., Shanghai; others at school; Past President of Tientsin Rotary Club, former Chairman of Tientsin Club, Chairman of the British Residents' Association; member of Committee of China Association, member of Shanghai Club and Shanghai Country Club, and the Thatched House Club, London.

Mr. Woodhead was educated at Brighton College and came to China to join the editorial staff of the North China Daily News in December, 1902. During his long journalistic career he was on the staff of the North China Daily News, 1902-11; acting correspondent for Reuters at Peking from May to November, 1911, during the First Revolution; Editor of the Peking and Tientsin Times, 1911-12, and 1914-30; joint founder and Editor of China Year Book, 1912; Editor of the Peking Gazette, 1913-14; North China correspondent for the London Morning Post, 1913-30, and is now Editorial Associate of the Shanghai Evening Post and Mercury.

Publications by Mr. Woodhead include The China Year Book, fourteen issues; "The Truth About the Chinese Republic", "Occidental Interpretations of the Far Eastern Problem" (Norman Waite Harris Memorial Lectures at the University of Chicago); "Problems of the Yangtze", and numerous pamphlets on China's international problems. He is regarded as one of the foremost authorities on political conditions in the Far East.

During 1903-04 Mr. Woodhead was a member of the Shanghai Volunteers and Fire Brigade and during 1915-17 he was a member of the Tientsin British Volunteers. For services rendered to the Allied cause in the World War he was awarded Commander of the British Empire (C.B.E.); Chevalier of the Order of Leopold II, and Medaille de la Reconnaissance Francaise (d'argent).

Wu, Dr. John C. H. (Wu Chin-hsiung): *Jurist, Legislator, Vice-Chairman of the Constitution Draft Committee of Legislative Yuan, Advisor to the Shanghai Municipal Council, Councillor of the City Government of Greater Shanghai, Principal of the Comparative Law School of China.*

BORN March 28, 1899, at Ningpo, Chekiang Province; son of Wu Chia-Ch'ang, who was a leading business man of Ningpo and was the first Chairman of its Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Wu has attained an exceptionally broad education at home and in the United States and Europe and has achieved high honours abroad and at home.

He studied first under a Confucian private tutor, but entered school in 1907, attended Hsiao Shih College of Ningpo, entered Shanghai Baptist College in 1916 and Peiyang University in Tientsin in 1917, which he left to attend the Comparative Law School of China, Shanghai, where he was graduated with first honour with the degree of LL.B. in 1920.

In the fall of the same year Dr. Wu proceeded to the United States and entered the Law School of the University of Michigan where he was awarded the degree of J. D. the following year. His work attracted such attention as to win him a Travelling Fellowship in International Law from the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. He studied during the year 1921-22 at the University of Berlin. Returning to the United States in 1923, he entered Harvard University Law School as a graduate student. In 1924 he returned to China and joined the faculty of the Comparative Law School of China, where he has lectured on more than ten subjects, including Law of Property, International Law, Roman Law, German Civil Law, Jurisprudence, Philosophy of Law, Torts, Agency.

He became Principal of the Law School in 1927. At his inauguration Professor Manley O. Hudson of Harvard, who was then in China, delivered a speech and gave expression to the following sentiments: "I have known Dr. Wu now for a number of years, and for as many years I have admired the range of his learning and the spirit with which he is constantly extending it. We in America feel greatly indebted to him for many illuminations of various questions of jurisprudence, and personally I count myself to have fallen behind the progress of juristic science whenever I have delayed to read his latest article."

In the same year (1927) he was appointed Judge of the Civil Division of the Shanghai Provisional Court. In 1928 he was appointed to the Codification Commission of the Ministry of Justice, later rejoining the Provisional Court as Presiding Judge of the Criminal Division of the Court of Appeals. Dr. Wu succeeded to the Presidency of the Court in 1929 but resigned soon afterward for the purpose of preparing lectures to be delivered at Northwestern University, Chicago, as holder of the Julius Rosenthal Foundation Lectureship and also accepted an invitation to join the faculty of Harvard University Law School.

Owing to the ill health of Mrs. Wu, Dr. Wu returned to China in the latter part of 1930, at that time purposing to take only a short leave, but found that other matters demanded his attention here, and so did not return to Harvard University as he had intended to do.

In 1931 he became Advisor on Municipal Affairs to the Shanghai Municipal Council. In September, 1932, he was appointed Councillor of the Provisional Council of the City Government of Greater Shanghai. In January, 1933, he was

appointed member of the Legislative Yuan by the Central Political Council through recommendation of Mr. Sun Fo, President of the Yuan. Upon acceptance of this appointment, Dr. Wu abandoned his valuable law practice in Shanghai. In view of his profound research in jurisprudence and extensive study of the World's legal systems, he was appointed by President Sun Fo as vice-Chairman of the Committee for drafting a Permanent Constitution for China.

Dr. Wu has written numerous works on jurisprudence and kindred subjects, some of which are as follows:—Juridical Essays and Studies (Chinese Commercial Press), The Balancing of Interests, Realistic Analysis of Legal Concepts, Confucius and the Legists, The Legal Systems of Old and New China, Types of Juridical Thinking. His Commentary on the Chinese Civil Code and Readings on Legal Philosophy are in course of publication.

Wu Lien-Teh: *Director, National Quarantine Service and Manchuria Plague Prevention Service.*

BORN March 10, 1879, in Penang, Straits Settlements, son of Wu Chi-hsueh and Lin Tsai-fan; married Miss Huang Shu-chiung, second daughter of Huang Nai-siong of Foochow, at Singapore, in 1905; son, Wu Chang-keng, who has taken degrees of B.A. at Johns Hopkins and Ph.D. in Public Health at Yale, and expects to complete medical studies at Rochester University in 1934: Member, Shanghai Bankers' Club and Union Club; Councillor, Royal Asiatic Society; ex-President of the National Medical Association of China.

A figure of international importance in the medical profession because of his contributions to science in several fields of research work, Dr. Wu Lien-teh has also won a high position in public health work. As Director of the National Quarantine Service and the Manchurian Plague Prevention Service he occupies posts of great importance in China.

After his early schooling Dr. Wu went to England and entered Emmanuel College, Cambridge. Completing his medical studies at St. Mary's Hospital, London, he later did research work at the Pasteur Institute, in Paris, the Hygienic Institute of Halle, Germany, and the School of Tropical Medicine, Liverpool. Degrees conferred upon him are, Cambridge, M.A., 1905; M.B., 1902; M.D., 1905; Dr. Med. sc. Tokio, 1926; Hon. sc. D., St. John's; Litt.D., Hongkong.

Following a few years in private practice at Penang, Dr. Wu was appointed Vice-President of the Imperial Army Medical College at Tientsin, in 1908. The Central Government sent him to Harbin to fight the pneumonic plague epidemic in 1910, and he has been chief of the Manchurian Plague Prevention Service since

International Plague Conference at Mukden in 1911, government delegate to the International Opium Conferences at The Hague, 1912 and 1913; government delegate to the International Medical Congress at London, 1913, and to the International Conference on School Hygiene at Buffalo, New York, U.S.A., 1913. He was visiting professor to the universities of Japan, 1923, Vice-President of the Far Eastern Association of Tropical Medicine, 1921-30, and government representative on the Advisory Council of the Health Section, League of Nations, at Geneva, 1931, and at Singapore, 1923-32.

A leader in health and medical education work, Dr. Wu has written a number of books and articles on these subjects. He is also the author of "Treatise on Pneumonic Plague," published by the League of Nations, 1926; "History of Chinese Medicine," in collaboration with Dr. K. C. Wong, 1932; Manchurian Plague Prevention Service Reports, in seven volumes; edited the National Medical Journal from 1914 until 1931, and issued Quarantine Service Reports, two series, 1930-32.

Active in many fields of public endeavor, Dr. Wu has rendered signal service on emergency committees during the Sino-Japanese troubles in the Shanghai area. He donated \$20,000 to the building fund of the new Royal Asiatic Society, the auditorium of which is named for him. He has always been interested in anti-opium movements and has liberally contributed both his professional services and his private funds to the work.

Wu Te-chen, General: *Mayor of Greater Shanghai.*

Now occupying one of the most important political posts within the gift of the National Government of China as Mayor of Greater Shanghai, General Wu Te-chen reached that office in 1930, after a career of more than twenty years in the service of his country, in both civil and military departments.

General Wu was born at Chungshan, Kwangtung Province, in 1888 and was educated at Kiukiang. His public career began with the revolutionary movement in 1911 when he was appointed Assistant Chief of General Staff of the Military Government of Kiangsi, serving concurrently as Commissioner for Foreign Affairs. He represented Kiangsi at the National Convention held at Nanking to draft the provisional constitution of the Republic and at which Dr. Sun Yat-sen, the great republican leader, was elected President.

He went to Honolulu in 1914 as a delegate of the Kuomintang Party to the overseas Chinese. Upon his return to China he was Counsellor to the Military Government of Canton, 1918; Adjutant to Dr. Sun Yat-sen, 1920; Field Commander of the

Revolutionary Army in Kwangtung, 1920; Magistrate of Chungshan by popular election, 1921; Commissioner General of Police, Kwangtung, and concurrently Commissioner of Public Safety, Canton, 1923; Commander of the Kwangtung Gendarmerie, 1924; and in the same year took command of the 1st. Independent Division of the Revolutionary Army, acting also as Adjutant-General to Dr. Sun.

Subsequently he served as Garrison Commander of Canton and later as Commander of the 17th. Division of the Revolutionary Army; 1925-26; was appointed Garrison Commander of Kwangtung and also served as Commissioner of Reconstruction for that province, 1928. He was variously entrusted with important honorary and political government missions and has also served as a member of the Legislative Yuan. Since 1929 the General has been a member of Central Executive Committee of the Kuomintang, and also of the Central Political Council.

In his present position as Mayor of Greater Shanghai, General Wu has won high regard for the efficiency of his administration. He is a charming and genial host and entertains frequently for visiting notables, both Chinese and foreign.

Yale, Sazain: *Compradore, Shanghai Land Investment Co., Ltd.*

MR. YALE occupies a position of great responsibility and trust as Compradore for the Shanghai Land Investment Co., Ltd., real estate owners and operators and investment agents.

Established for many years, the Shanghai Land Investment Co., Ltd., is one of the largest firms in its field in Shanghai and has contributed much to the development of the modern city.

Yang Moi Nan: *Chinese General Manager, Butterfield & Swire.*

BORN at Shanghai in 1873, Mr. Yang Moi Nan is a native of Chungshan, Kwangtung Province. He was educated in the Anglo-Chinese College of Shanghai and began his business career in the shipping department of Butterfield & Swire, merchants and steamship agents and one of the largest British firms in the Orient. Promoted to the company's office at Chefoo, he at that time assisted in establishing branches on the northern coast of China.

Active in civic affairs during his sojourn at Chefoo, Mr. Yang was a member of the Boards of Directors of the Good Roads Movement, the Canton Guild, Commission on the Chefoo-Wehsien Railway, Chefoo International Committee, Chefoo Chamber of Commerce, International Famine Relief Association, Anti-Opium Association, and the Shangtung Silk & Lace Co., and was Honorary President of the Chefoo Young Men's Christian Association.

In 1919 another promotion brought Mr. Yang back to the headquarters of Butterfield & Swire in Shanghai, and since the Summer of 1932 he has been Chinese General Manager of the firm. He is a member of the Canton Guild, Red Cross Association of China, Union Club of China, Shanghai Bankers' Club, China Navigation Association, and a Director of Lee Tai Chong & Co. and Yuan Tai & Co.

Mr. Yang has served as Adviser to the Ministry of Communications of the Chinese Government and in 1922 was awarded the Chia Ho Decoration, 3rd. Class.

Yang, Frederic T.: *Chinese Manager, Second Vice President China Finance Corporation.*

MR. YANG is a native of Kwangtung Province and was born in Shanghai in September, 1901, the son of Mr. Yang Moi Nan, a prominent merchant of Shanghai who is the Chinese General Manager of Messrs. Butterfield & Swire.

In the years 1907-1914 he pursued his studies in North China in Chinese literature and also had private tuition in English. In 1915 he came to Shanghai and was admitted to the Lowrie High School. In 1917 he studied at St. John's

University, and in 1922 sailed for America for advanced studies in the Wharton School of Finance and Banking of the University of Pennsylvania. He specialized in banking, particularly in the Federal Reserve System. In 1925 he obtained the degree of Bachelor of Science.

During his college days he was active in Chinese Students Welfare and served in many capacities as Treasurer and Vice President of the Chinese Students Club, Chinese Students' Banking Club, St. John's Alumni Club. He was initiated into the Phi Lamda Fraternity in 1925 and has served as Treasurer after he arrived in Shanghai. After his graduation, he worked with several banks in Philadelphia as assistant receiving teller and also worked in one of the largest auto financing companies in Philadelphia.

Upon his return to Shanghai, late in 1926, he immediately joined the Shanghai Commercial & Savings Bank. In 1927 he joined the Nanyang Brothers Tobacco Co. as their Purchasing Agent. During two years there he made many changes in the factory and installed the central purchasing department. Due to labor troubles in the factory he was compelled to resign.

In 1929 he was called to join the China Finance Corporation, and is at present their Chinese Manager and Second Vice President. In his present capacity he has rendered valuable service to that corporation and has always upheld the principle, "Service to the Community plus Profit-Making."

Yang, S. N. (Yang Siao Nan): *Shipping Man.*

BORN May 7, 1900, in Shanghai, a native of Chungshan District, Kwangtung, son of Yang Moi Nan; married Chun Chien Yu in Shanghai, February 6, 1925; daughter, Huei Lan; sons, Ti Ming, Ti Soong and Ti Liang: Member, Van Wang Doo Club, Chinese Shipping Club, etc.

Mr. Yang was educated at St. John's University, Shanghai, taking his degree B.A. Economics in 1925. In school he was distinguished as a versatile Chinese scholar. His first position after finishing his education was as chief accountant of the Industrial Bank of China, Shanghai, 1925-26.

In 1926 he joined the great British shipping firm, Butterfield & Swire, as an accountant in the Compradore's office, held that position until 1927 and has since been in charge of the Chinese interests of the shipping department of the company. His father, Mr. Yang Moi Nan, a well known business man, has been an executive official of Butterfield & Swire for many years.

Yannoulatos, Emmanuel P.: *Silk Merchant; General Manager, China Merchants' Pongee Ass'n., Fed. Inc., U. S. A.*

BORN August 19, 1887, in Samos, Greece; married Chrysso Lillian Lederer of Washington, D. C., July 3, 1920: Clubs, American, Cercle Sportif Francais,

International Recreation, Chinese Jockey; Past President of Hellenic Communal Association (1927-32); Past President Hellenic Benevolent Society; Member Foreign Silk Association, Chefoo, Shanghai, etc.

One of the most prominent silk merchants and exporters in North China, and the active executive head of three important firms, Mr. Yannoulatos has been in business in the Orient for almost thirty years, having come to China in September, 1906, to represent his father's firm and other Greek manufacturers and producers. He had received his education at the Commercial Lyceum of Samos, Greece, and served his apprenticeship at the agency of the Credit Lyonnais Samos.

In 1910, in Chefoo, Mr. Yannoulatos organized the China Merchants' Pongee Association, of which he is still General Manager, with head offices in Shanghai and a branch in Chefoo. He later established, with his brothers, the firm of Yannoulatos Bros. (China), of Chefoo and Shanghai, silk merchants, general exporters and shipping and insurance agents. This firm has recently acquired from the Greek Government a concession for the exploitation of oil fields in Macedonia. In 1932 in partnership with Mr. Paul Le Bris, former President of the French Municipal Council, Mr. Yannoulatos formed the P. Le Bris Export-Import, S.R.L., of Shanghai and Paris, of which he is the Managing Director in China.

The Chinese Government, in recognition of Mr. Yannoulatos' activity in fostering the exportation of silk to foreign countries, has commended him for the valuable services of his firm to the country.

Mr. Yannoulatos has always taken great interest in the welfare of the Greek community and frequently during the past twenty-five years has written enlightening articles concerning Greece for the foreign press of China. His favourite recreations are racing and shooting.

Yao Yung-Li: *Attorney-at-Law.*

BORN in 1900 at Shaoshing, Chekiang Province, son of Yao Ting Sen and Chao Meng Hwa; married Chang Yung Wei, at Peking, August 5, 1927; one daughter, Show Yu, and two sons, Show Kwei and Show Duh; member, American University Club, Tsing Hwa Club, Shanghai Bankers' Club, Chinese General Chamber of Commerce.

As an educator, in public service, and in his extensive private practice, Dr. Yao, although still a young man, has had a brilliant career in his chosen profession, the law. He is legal adviser to the Shanghai Bankers' Association, to the Association's Joint Reserve Board, and to the Salt Revenues department of the Chinese Government (Chief Inspectorate). Notable distinction was conferred upon him late in 1932 when he was appointed legal representative of the Ministry of Finance of the National Government to go to the United States in charge of important government cases.

Dr. Yao, while a student at Tsing Hua College, Peking, was selected to go to the United States on a Boxer Indemnity scholarship and studied at Yale University, won his A. B. degree, received the Wells Williams scholarship at Yale Law School for being a promising Chinese student, and received his J. D. degree from the Law School of the University of Chicago. He represented China on legal problems at the Far Eastern Conference at Chicago in 1925 and travelled extensively in the United States, studying its judicial system.

Upon his return to China he came to Shanghai and was appointed Professor in the Comparative Law School and the law school of Dah Hsia University and Professor of Commercial Law at Futan University. Appointed a member of the Law Codification Commission of the Ministry of Industry and Commerce in 1928, Dr. Yao was instrumental in drafting the Negotiable Instruments Law, Maritime Law, Law of Companies, etc., etc., a most important contribution to the new order of legal procedure in China.

This fine background of achievement gave Dr. Yao an exceptional degree of success in the establishment of his private practice. Despite the heavy demands on his time, Dr. Yao, through a sense of duty, frequently sacrifices his personal interests to answer the call of public service.

Yen, Dr. U. Y.

DR. YEN, living in semi-retirement, resides at No. 60, Bearn Apartments, 265 Avenue Joffre, in the French Concession of Shanghai. He has had a notable career in public and civic service.

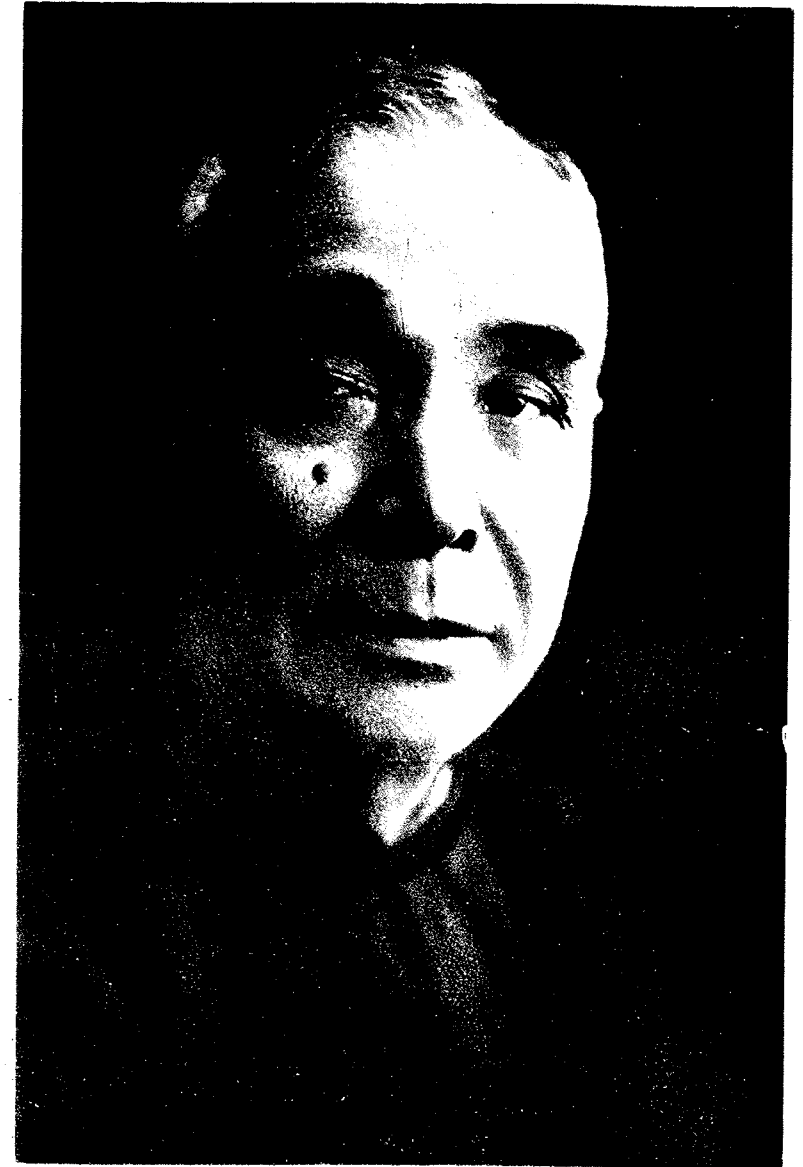
Yu Ya-ching: *Shipowner.*

MR. YU YA-CHING, head of the San Peh Steam Navigation Co., Ltd., is the leading shipowner in China, and a prominent member of various financial and commercial organizations.

He was born on the 18th day of the 5th Lunar Moon in the year 1867 at Lungshan (Ningpo). At the age of 15 he came to Shanghai and joined the firm of a Chinese indigo and dye merchant. Though quite young he soon proved his ability as a keen and energetic business man, and succeeded in making such large profits for the firm that he was taken in by his employer as a partner.

Realizing his ability, his services were sought for by several foreign commercial firms and banking houses, such as Messrs. Reuter, Brockelmann & Co., the Russo-Asiatic Bank, the Netherlands Trading Society, etc.

In about the year 1908, Mr. Yu was responsible for the inauguration of the Ningpo Commercial Bank, Ltd., and the Ningpo-Shaoshing Steam Navigation Co., Ltd. Both enterprises flourished under his able direction, and made great strides of progress.

Then he started the San Peh S. N. Co., Ltd., with a modest capital, but today it is one of the largest steamship companies in China.

In addition to the activities outlined in the above, Mr. Yu is a member of the Shanghai Municipal Council, a member of the Advisory Committee of the Municipality of Greater Shanghai, and other official organs, as well as a director of numerous commercial and public utility companies. He is now 66 years old, but still active and healthy as ever. He has 3 sons, 2 daughters and 23 grandchildren.

Yuan, L. T. (Yuan Lee-tung): *Corporation Executive.*

BORN July 17, 1879, at Ning Hsien, Ningpo, Chekiang Province, son of Yuan Sih-yuen; married at Ning Hsien on October 15, 1903; son, Ching Po (Sun Tsai), employed by Universal Leaf Tobacco Co., of China, Inc., and two daughters, Chai Ling and Chai Yung, both students; Member, and past officer and committee member, of the Shanghai Chinese General Chamber of Commerce, Ningpo Association of Shanghai, Shanghai Y.M.C.A., World's Chinese Students' Federation, Chinese and Foreign Famine Relief committees, Chinese Ratepayers' Association of Shanghai, etc.

Born in poverty, receiving his primary education through the aid of missionaries, Mr. Yuan's career proves the proverb that man is the architect of his own fortune. Holding a fine record of public service, he is also an executive of two important corporations, being General Manager of the Ningpo-Shaoshing Steam Navigation Co., Ltd., and Chinese Manager of the Universal Leaf Tobacco Co. of China, Inc. He is also a member of the Shanghai Municipal Council, governing body of the International Settlement, having been elected to the Chinese advisory committee in 1923, committee member of the Council in 1927, and Councillor in 1928, an office to which he has been returned at each election.

Mr. Yuan studied at the English Methodist College at Ningpo, was graduated from St. John's University in Shanghai in 1904, and was vice principal of the English Methodist College and residing pastor of a Methodist Mission chapel at Ningpo until 1912. He was Deputy Chief Commissioner of Foreign Affairs and Communications of the Military Government of Ningpo during the Revolution of 1911; assistant to the President of the Hankow-Canton-Szechuen Railway, 1912; sub-manager of the Commercial Press of Shanghai, 1912-14; and later served in turn as Chinese Manager of the American Trading Co., and Manager of the Tai Chong Tobacco Co., at Hankow. He has been General Manager of the Ningpo-Shaoshing Steam Navigation Co., Ltd., since 1921 and in 1930 assumed additional responsibilities as Chinese Manager of the Universal Leaf Tobacco Co., of China, Inc.

Despite the heavy demands made on his time by public service and private business affairs, Mr. Yuan is an active and tireless supporter of benevolent and charitable undertakings, working through and assisting in the maintenance of many organizations devoted to these ends.

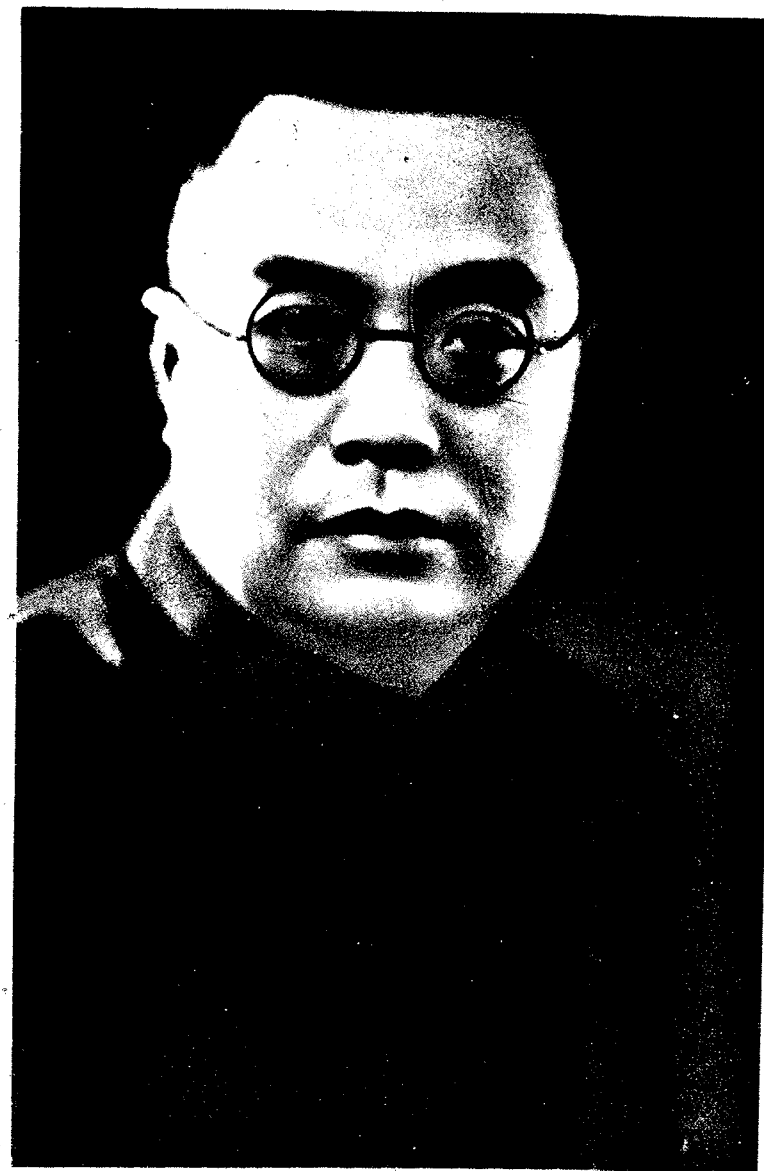
Zau, S. U. (Chao Chin Ching): *Director of Town Syndicate.*

BORN in Shanghai in 1883, son of Mr. and Mrs. Zau Chien Hu; married Miss Wu Shiu Yin in Shanghai in 1905; has 12 children, who are graduates of or students in universities in China or abroad; Deacon of the First Baptist Church, Shanghai.

Mr. Zau received his early education from private tutors preparatory to taking literary examinations and at that time also studied English. He took entrance examinations at the Telegraph Administration, Kiangnan Military Academy and the Peiyang Medical College and passed with distinction. At the age of fourteen he left home and went into business but later entered Wei Tsung College, Shanghai, and majored in English. When the Shanhaikwan Railway College was moved to Shanghai during the Boxer troubles he entered that institution for a year and passed the postal examinations. It was at that period that he joined the Christian Church.

In 1902 Mr. Zau was appointed Postmaster of Tatung, Anhwei Province, but resigned to join his family in Shanghai. On his return to Shanghai he became Translator for the Diffusion Society (The Christian Literature Society) to edit an encyclopedia, served as Trustee of the Ming Jang and Eliza Yates Girls' Schools and was engaged in many and varied business affairs.

He has served as member of the Commission for raising loans in Kiangsu and Chekiang, Advisor to the Cabinet of the Central Government, Director and Chairman of the General Chamber of Commerce of Shanghai, Advisor to the Bureau of Taxation on Tobacco and Wines, and his recommendations then made are the basis of the present taxation system; was China's special delegate representing the Central Government at the Pan-Pacific Commercial Conference in Honolulu; was first Chinese to be a member of the Shanghai Municipal Council; Director of the Shanghai Office of the Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Labour; Director of the Bureau of Industrial and Commercial Information; Vice Minister of Industries, Vice Chairman of the Commission for the Rendition of the Shanghai Mixed Court, Vice Chairman of the Chinese Volunteer Corps, Shanghai; Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Anti-opium Association; Director and Committeeman of the China Institute of Scientific Management; Director of the Foreign Trade Association; Chairman of the Shanghai Y.M.C.A.; Director of the University of Shanghai, University of Utopia, University of Great China, Kwang Hwa University and of the Law College and Medical College of the Central University; a director of the Red Cross; Chairman of the Board of the Baptist Publication Society and Founder of the Sze Peng Primary School.

Zee, T. B. (Zee Tuh-Bei): *General Compradore, Gibb Livingston & Co., Ltd.*

BORN in August, 1903, Mr. Zee before reaching the age of thirty attained his present responsible position as General Compradore of Gibb, Livingston & Co., Ltd., importers and exporters, general merchants and shipping and insurance agents, one of the largest and most important British firms in China. He is also a Supervising Director of the Hwa An Commercial & Savings Bank of Shanghai.

Mr. Zee is the son of Zee Ling Yuen, is married and the father of three children. He is a member of the Shanghai Bankers' Club. He was educated at St. John's University, Shanghai.

Zee, T. T. (Tsung-Tong Zee): *Manager, Montigny Branch, Kinchong Banking Corporation.*

BORN February 28, 1902, at Shanghai, son of Way Zung Zee and Tsung Zung; married Lily Yen, daughter of late Tse-Kuen Yen, famous merchant in Shanghai and Tientsin, and a graduate of Ginling College, Nanking, at Shanghai, April 26, 1932: Member, Flip Flap Fraternity (Secretary), Y's Men Club (Treasurer), Shanghai College Alumni Association (Director), University of Michigan Club of Shanghai (Secretary), American University Club (Publicity Committee), American Returned Students' Association (Finance Committee), Amity Lodge of Freemasons, Shanghai Bankers' Club, Shanghai Bankers' Institute, Chinese Recreation Club (Committee), Chinese Referees' Association (President), East China Inter-collegiate Athletic Association (President), China National Amateur Athletic Federation (Committee).

Now holding a responsible position in the banking world as Manager of the Montigny Branch (Shanghai) of the Kinchong Banking Corporation, one of the largest financial institutions in China, Mr. Zee was appointed to that post in 1931, before he was thirty years of age.

Taking his B.A. degree at Shanghai College in 1925, Mr. Zee later went to the United States for further study and was awarded the M.S. degree at the

University of Michigan in 1929. An honor student at Michigan, he was also a Research Fellow of the Roy D. Chapin Fellowship in Highway Transportation, 1928-29.

Mr. Zee was an Instructor in Business Administration and Physical Director at Shanghai College, 1926; Assistant Manager of the National Transport Company, 1926-27; Assistant General Manager of the National Car Company, 1929-31, and in the latter year was appointed Manager of the Montigny Branch of the Kincheng Banking Corporation, concurrently serving as Manager of the Motor Car Department of the Tai Ping Insurance Company, a subsidiary of the bank. He is also now serving as a member of the Board of Directors of the University of Shanghai and Secretary of the Board.

Ziar Pah Zu: *Managing Director, Kwang Hwa Petroleum Co., Ltd.*

A CHINESE scholar of distinction, particularly interested in the ancient literature and the art of writing of his country, a wonderfully rich field of research and study, Mr. Ziar Pah Zu is also a well known and influential business man of Shanghai.

His principal business interests at the present time center in the importation and distribution of petroleum and the manufacture of Chinese-produced goods. It is his expectation, however, upon his retirement from active business, to continue his study of literature and art. He has made a remarkable collection of relics of literary work and is compiling an index of his treasures. He is planning to write books on this subject when he has the leisure.

Besides being a Managing Director of the Kwang Hwa Petroleum Co., Ltd., Mr. Ziar is Chairman of the Boards of Directors of the China Petroleum Co., Ltd., and the Ta Ming Electricity Co. of Hsiao Hsing, and other extensive business interests are represented as a Director of the Central Trust Co., the Tien-Yih Ve-mo Co., and the Kai Cheng Acids Co. He was a committee member of the Chinese Ratepayers' Association and of the Hsoa Hsing Association. He founded the Yu Yoa Orphans' Home. Mr. Ziar has served as Sub-Manager of the Hongkew branch of the Commercial Bank of China and as Compradore of the Italian Bank for China.

Mr. Ziar was born in Shanghai but his nativity is of Yu Yoa Hsien, Chekiang Province. He comes of a prominent family. His father, Ziar Hon Fu, died when he was very young. His grandfather, Ziar Lung Hwei, was a well known Shanghai financier, at one time Manager of the Commercial Bank of China. Two uncles, Kwang Fu and Tao Fu, were both financiers and another uncle, Yung

Sing, a lawyer, was also a retired Judge from the High Court of the International Settlement of Shanghai. Mr. Ziar's son, Ho Sung, aged 20, is a graduate of the Middle School of Chekiang University, and his daughters, Tan Hsia, 18, and Siao Hsia, 17, are students at the McTyeire School. Mr. Ziar was educated at Ching Chung School, Kien Hsing School and St. John's University.

Zing Zung Ching: *Banker and Financier.*

ENGAGED in business in Shanghai for forty years, Mr. Zing Zung Ching is one of the outstanding bankers and business leaders of North China, with extensive personal interests and heavy responsibilities as an executive administrator.

Especially active in banking, Mr. Zing is Manager of the Foo Yuen Bank and Managing Director and Manager of the Land Bank of China. He is also a Supervisor of the Central Bank of China, the China Merchants' Steam Navigation Co., and the Bank of the Shanghai Municipality. Until quite recently he was Manager of the Shanghai branch of the Bank of Communications.

Other interests are represented by Mr. Zing as Chairman of the Boards of Directors of the Chung Wha Lee Kee Weaving Mill, the Dah Foong Ching Kee Weaving Mill and the Dah Yoa Yue Oil Mill.

Also active in civic and semi-civic affairs, Mr. Zing is a member and former Vice President of the Chamber of Commerce of Shanghai, Chairman of the powerful Native Bankers' Association, and is a member of the Advisory Board of the Municipality of Greater Shanghai.

Evans, Charles Thomas: *Manager, Boyd & Company, Ltd.*

BORN December 9, 1907, in Malta, son of Charles Leopold Evans and Lily Evans-Fenner; unmarried: Clubs, Amoy and International, of Amoy, and the Shanghai Cricket Club, Shanghai Rugby Club and Royal Air Force Association, of Shanghai.

Mr. Evans was educated at the Dunfermline High School, at Dunfermline, Fife, Scotland, and the University of Hongkong, at Hongkong. He first arrived in China April 30, 1922, with his parents.

He began his business career as an assistant in the offices of Lowe, Bingham & Matthews, Chartered Accountants, in Hongkong, serving from March 1, 1925, until August 31, 1928; was accountant for Boyd & Co. at Amoy and Foochow, November 1, 1928, to December 31, 1931; Manager of Boyd & Co., Ltd., at Amoy, January 1, 1932, to October 30, 1932, and since November 1, 1932, has occupied his present position as Manager of Boyd & Co., Ltd., in Shanghai.

Boyd & Co., Ltd., importers, exporters and insurance agents, operate in Hongkong, Amoy, Foochow, and Shanghai, and are incorporated under the companies' ordinances of Hongkong.

Haward, Edwin: *Editor, North China Daily News.*

EXTENSIVE experience as a journalist in India preceded Mr. Haward's removal to Shanghai in 1930 to accept his present position as Editor of the North China Daily News, outstanding British newspaper of the Far East.

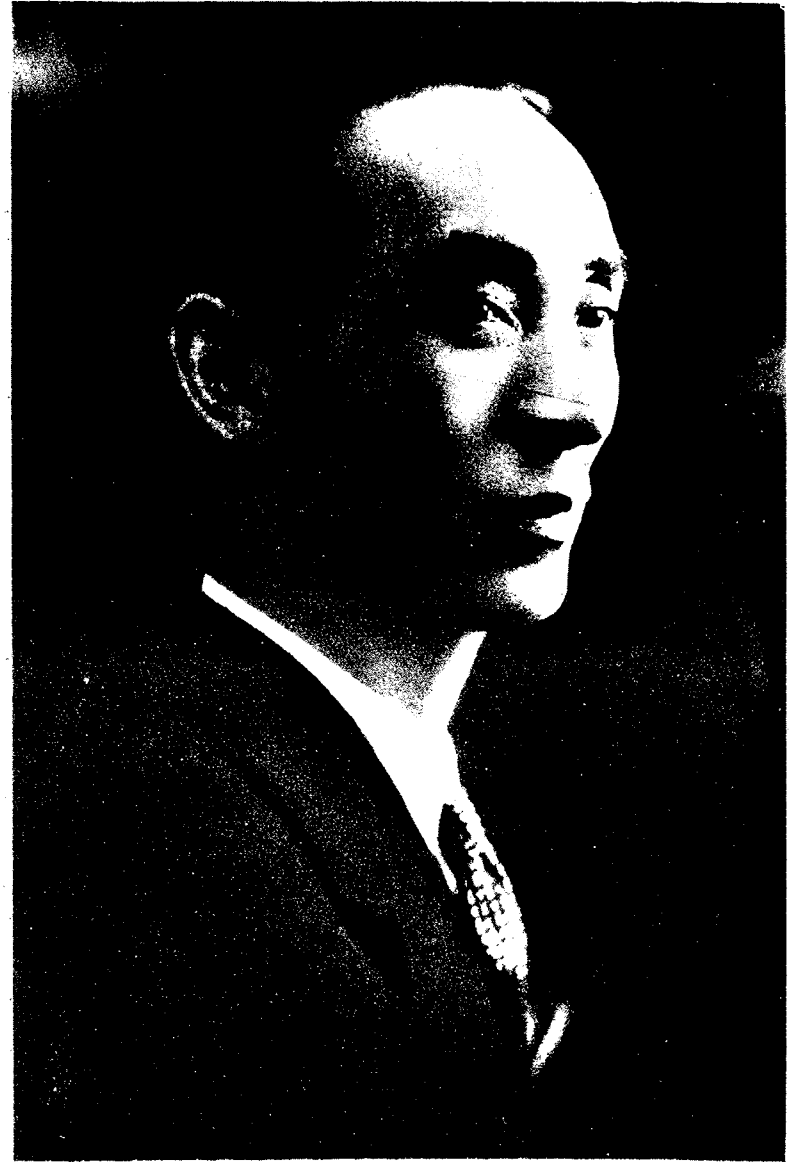
He joined the staff of the Civil and Military Gazette in 1909, became Manager in 1916 and Manager and Editor in 1920. He was Correspondent for The Pioneer and The Times (London) at the Headquarters of the Government of India, 1921-25; Editor, The Pioneer, at Allahabad, 1926-28; Special Correspondent of The Pioneer on the Prince of Wales' tour in Bombay and Rajputana, 1921, and Special Correspondent in Waziristan, 1923 (medal). He commanded a machine gun volunteer battery in the Punjab Riots and for his services received the thanks of the Secretary of State.

Immediately prior to coming to Shanghai, Mr. Haward served as Information Officer at India Office, 1928-30. He is the author of The Last Rebellion, The

Poodle Fakir, India's Defence Problems, Pioneers on Four Fronts, European Non-Officials in the Indian Legislature, and The Manchurian Medley. Mr. Haward was born at Bungay, October 9, 1884. He was educated at Reading School and King's College, London.

King Ding Seng: *Banker and Financier.*

Mr. King Ding Seng is the General Manager of the Dah Yung Company, sole agents for the National State Lottery of the Chinese Government, which every three months distributes \$5,000,000 in tickets for the prize drawing. He is also associated in an executive capacity with a number of important financial institutions.

Born in Ningpo, Chekiang Province, in 1884, Mr. King Ding Seng was educated in his native city before coming to Shanghai to enter on his business career. He is a graduate of the Ningpo Middle School. He married Miss Chang Po-lin and is the father of four sons and one daughter. The eldest son, Yuen Sung, following in his father's footsteps, is head of the Savings Department of the Kiangsu-Chekiang Commercial & Savings Bank, Ltd. The other children are still in school.

A man of extensive business interests, Mr. King Ding Seng has served as Managing Director of the Ding Sung Native Bank of Ningpo, Business Manager of the Kiang Shun Steam Navigation Co., Director of the Wah Foong Paper Mill, Director of the Kiangsu-Chekiang Commercial & Savings Bank, Ltd., Director of the Chung Wai Bank, Director of the Kiangnan Bank, and is a Supervisor of the government-controlled China Merchants' Steam Navigation Co.

Active in public and civic affairs, he is a committee member of the Chamber of Commerce of Shanghai (Chinese), a Councillor of the French Municipal Council, and serves as Chairman of the Board of the Jen Chi Hospital of Ningpo.

Luthy, Emil: *Civil Engineer and Surveyor.*

BORN in Switzerland, in 1887: Educated at Swiss Public Schools, Surveyors' College at Winterthur, Technical College at Burgdorf (Diploma of the Civil Engineering Section): Member, L'Union Suisse des Techniciens, Engineering Society of China, American Club.

Engaged in professional practise in Shanghai for eighteen years, Mr. Luthy also had extensive experience in Europe before coming to China. He began his professional career for Mr. L. Moser, Civil Engineer, at Bienne, making various topographical and other surveys, engineering designs, etc. Working for Mr. C. Schmid, with engineering office at Weesen, he conducted various cadastral, topographical and

engineering surveys in the Alps and lowlands, designing and supervising many Drinkwater-works and installations, designing several hydro-power plants, roads, canals, pipelines, etc.

Employed at the head offices of Messrs. Ed. Zublin & Co. at Strassburg, Alsace, he made the calculations and designs for various large reinforced concrete constructions, particularly foundations, buildings, factories, bridges, etc. As the (sworn) City Engineer of Tablat, St. Gallen, Switzerland, he was in charge of the public engineering offices during a period marked by extensive building operations, of roads, bridges, drainage and sewer projects. Following this, he was in charge of extensive additions and alterations to the cellulose and paper factory at Fabriken Landquart.

Coming to Shanghai in the Spring of 1913, Mr. Luthy designed and supervised the foundation and construction of the first modern eight-storey reinforced concrete building in the Far East, the McBain Building, now the Asiatic Petroleum Company's building. In the employment of Messrs. Moorhead & Halse, he designed and supervised many construction projects, both in Shanghai and the outports. In 1921 he joined his brother, Mr. C. Luthy, in Shanghai and was engaged in topographical surveys, the design of the China Portland Cement Factory at Lungtan, power stations, factories, buildings, wharves, and the layout and design of the new Chapei water works.

Mr. Luthy opened his own engineering office in 1926 and was constructional expert for Messrs. Moorhead, Halse & Robinson, later known as Messrs. Spence, Robinson & Partners. During this period he designed the construction of the first seven-storey godowns in Shanghai and many other large buildings, including the Fukien Road Telephone Exchange. In 1931 he was forced into temporary retirement by illness. Mr. Luthy resides at 70 Hart Road.

McLure, Alexander: *Senior Partner of Seth, Manceu & McLure, Chartered Accountants.*

BORN November 21, 1887, son of Alexander and Christina (Cameron) McLure; married Helen Russell McNeil in Shanghai, April 18, 1925; son, Donald McLure: Clubs, Thatched House, London; Manila, Manila, P.I., and Shanghai, Zero, Cercle Sportif Francais, Shanghai Race, Shanghai Golf, etc., of Shanghai.

Educated at Hutchesons Grammer School, Glasgow, and Glasgow University, Mr. McLure began professional work as an apprentice with Church & Greig, Chartered Accountants, of Glasgow, remaining with the firm from 1904 until 1910, when he came to the Far East as an employe of Henry Hunter Bayne & Co., Chartered Accountants, of Manila. He became a partner in this company and

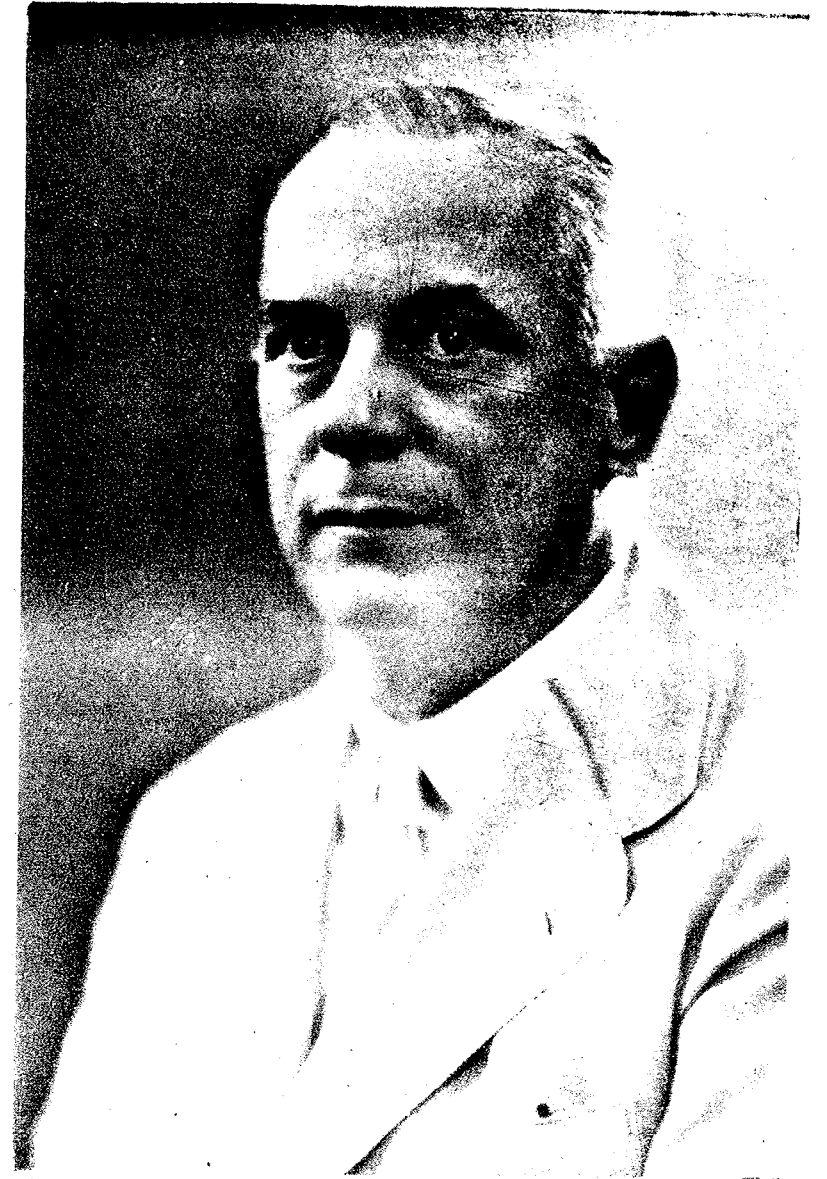


MR. A. McLURE

with the exception of two years spent in the army during the Great War remained in Manila until November, 1919, when he came to Shanghai. He is now the senior partner of Seth, Mancell & McLure, Chartered Accountants.

Seth, Mancell & McLure operate in a much larger business field than is customarily comprehended by the professional practice of chartered accountancy, acting as general managers for the Anglo-China Finance, Ltd., Shanghai Kelantan Rubber Estates (1925), Ltd., Taylor Garage, Ltd., and Star Shipping Co., Ltd.; secretaries for the International Investment Trust Co. of China, Ltd., Yangtze Finance Co., Ltd., Commercial Finance Co., Ltd., Huangpoo Investment Co., Ltd., Union Brewery, Ltd., James Hamilton, Ltd., United Theatres, Ltd., China Transport & Storage Co., Ltd., and Haig Court, Ltd.; financial managers for New Zealand Perpetual Forests, Ltd., and Smith, Wylie & Co., Ltd., and are the share office for Le Champ de Courses Francais, and Fonciere et Immobiliere de Chine.

Miao Kay-pah: *Civil Engineer.*

MR. MIAO KAY-PAH, a distinguished Chinese figure in the engineering profession, conducts an extensive business as a land and estate agent in addition to conducting his professional practise as a Civil Engineer and Architect. His headquarters are maintained at Lane 13, 733 Connaught Road, Shanghai.

Sargeant, Philip A.: *Mechanical Engineer.*

BORN July 23, 1882, at Lynn, Massachusetts, U.S.A., son of George D. and Annie E. (Tapley) Sargeant; married Lillian Crawford Ellsworth at Malden, Massachusetts, April 17, 1906: Mason, member of Converse Lodge, Malden, Massachusetts; Scottish Rite Bodies, 32nd. degree, and Afiifi Temple, of Tacoma, Washington, of the Mystic Shrine: Clubs, Cercle Sportif Francais, Shanghai, American.

A mechanical engineer with exceptionally broad experience in heating and plumbing installations, Mr. Sargeant has been at the head of his own contracting business in Shanghai for the past fourteen years. Educated at the Lynn, Mass., High School and the Franklin Institute of Technology, at Boston, where he won his M. E. degree, Mr. Sargeant went to sea after leaving school and became an engineer with the United Fruit Co., working on steamers plying between the United States and Jamaica for five years. He next joined The Merrill Company of Boston, one of the largest engineering firms in the eastern part of the United States, and later became their outside superintendent in charge of all heating and plumbing contracting work, holding this position ten years.

MEN OF SHANGHAI

He was sent to Athens, Greece, by The Merrill Company to install the mechanical equipment in a hospital and school of domestic science which were sponsored by the late Queen of Greece. After completing this project he returned to the United States and worked for the U.S. Government in the construction of torpedo boat destroyers at the Fore River Shipyards, Quincy, Mass.

Mr. Sargeant first came to China in November, 1918, as mechanical engineer for Peking Union Medical College at Peking, designing equipment for the hospital and medical school buildings, and was in full charge of mechanical installations for all buildings. He came to Shanghai early in 1920 and entered business for himself. He has since designed and installed some of the largest heating and plumbing plants in the Far East but in recent years has been occupied more with design work than with contracting. Two of his most important projects, in this field of work, were the Dairen General Hospital, owned and operated by the South Manchuria Railroad, and the National Central Mint of the Chinese Government in Shanghai. While with the Merrill Company he was associated with some of the very largest building projects, with relation to heating and plumbing installations, carried out in the eastern part of the United States during the years 1905-18.

Wang Chen: *Philanthropist, Artist, and Capitalist.*

Mr. Wang Chen, alias Wang I. Ding, an outstanding figure of Shanghai, has had a remarkable career of service as a business man and in public and government affairs, and is known as a philanthropist in all charitable works and as a zealot in all worthy educational undertakings. Because he is a Buddhist he is very indifferent to the privileges that he deserves. He is a native of Wuhsing, Chekiang Province, but as he was born in Shanghai he received his early education in Shanghai Kwang Fang College. At the early age of fifteen he began work as an apprentice clerk in a native bank. When twenty-three he was appointed Manager of the Tien Yu Trading Co. and ten years later became the Compradore for both the Nippon Yusen Kaisha and Osaka Shosen Kaisha, big Japanese shipping firms.

Thus well launched on his career he subsequently served as Chairman of the Boards of Directors of the Chinese Electric Power Co., Shanghai Flour Exchange, Wah Cheng Fire & Marine Insurance Co., Chung Hwa Commercial & Savings Bank, and Kiang Nan Bank; and as a Director of Kung Dah Cotton Mill, Tokwa Cotton Mill, and Toa Semia Kaisha; and as General Manager of the Dai Dah Steamship and Wharf Co., and has been connected with many other important corporations during his many years of business activity.

In public and semi-public life Mr. Wang Chen has served as Chairman of the Shanghai Chamber of Commerce, Vice Chairman of the General Chamber of Commerce, Chairman of Directors of the Bureau of Municipal Affairs of the

Municipality of Greater Shanghai, and has been Chairman or Committee Member of the Anti-Kidnapping Society, China Philanthropic Association, China Red Cross Association, Shanghai Public Benevolent Cemetery, Zung Tsi Tang, Chinese Foreign Famine Relief Commission, Lester Hospital, Government Famine Relief Commission, Huai Ho Conservancy, Buddhist Laymen's Society, Kure Karma Buddhist Association, White Cross Society, Lien Nyi Benevolence Society, Chinese Moral Society, Shanghai Industrial Orphanage, Chinese Fire Station, Bureau of Public Works in Chinese City, House for Old, House for Cripples, Great China University, and Chung Hwa Commercial School, and has aided many other benevolent institutions.

During the first year of the Republic, Mr. Wang Chen served under President Sun Yat-sen as Director of Communications, Agriculture, Labor and Commerce, being an influential factor in the formation and direction of the new government. Now living much in retirement, his favorite diversions are Chinese painting and writing, which have been much prized not only by Chinese but also by those of other countries. His assumed name for his painting and writing is "Pai Lung Shan Jen", and at present he is a distinguished artist of China.

White, Augustus Victor: *Exchange Broker; Partner, White & Co.*

BORN in Shanghai, July 8, 1897, son of William Augustus and Clara (Cooke) White; married Katharine Elizabeth Godsil in Shanghai, October 12, 1921; children, Augustus Ronald and Derek Godsil White, attending Winton House, Winchester, England, and two younger children, at home: Clubs, Shanghai Race, American, Shanghai Recreation, Cercle Sportif Francais, Shanghai Football, and International Recreation.

An Exchange Broker, and as such a partner in two prominent Shanghai firms, Mr. White is also an officer and director in other companies. He was educated at the Shanghai Public School and in 1916 entered the firm of White & Company, with which his family has long been identified. The firm is one of the oldest in Shanghai, dating back to 1858. Mr. White is also a partner in White & Pote-Hunt, members of the Shanghai Stock Exchange, in which organization he also holds an individual membership.

In addition to these immediate business interests, Mr. White is also a Director of the Mercantile Printing Co., Treasurer of the United Bond Investment Co., and Managing Director of Whitsons, Ltd., importers, exporters and commission agents. He is keenly interested in outdoor sports and athletics, having served for several years on the Executive Committees of the Shanghai Football and Shanghai

Lawn Tennis associations and he represented Great Britain at tennis for the Roper Cup, an international competition. A prominent racing man, his pony "Pat" gave him the honour of winning the "Sharforce Challenge Cup, Shanghai Champions," in the Autumn of 1929.

White, Harry Owen: *Exchange Broker; Senior Partner, White & Company, Bill and Bullion Brokers.*

BORN June 8, 1875, in Shanghai, son of Augustus White; married Augusta Basto da Silva in Shanghai, January 18, 1902; son, Harry (Henry) Augustus White, educated in the Shanghai Public School and under the tutorship of the Rev. William Smart of Springfield, Hythe, and now engaged in business with White & Co., Shanghai: Fellow, The Royal Geographical Society, London; member, Shanghai Race Club, Royal Societies Club, London; Overseas League, London.

As the senior partner of White & Company, Bill and Bullion Brokers, Mr. H. O. White is at the head of one of the oldest foreign firms in Shanghai. It was originally founded in 1858, seventy-five years ago, by Mr. Rowley Miller, who was joined in partnership in 1862 by Mr. Augustus White, father of Mr. H. O. White, the subject of this biography. Mr. Augustus White was a son of the famous banker, Mr. Augustus Jackson White, one of the founders of The City Bank of London, which later amalgamated with The Midland Bank and was known as The City & Midland Bank, and is now The Midland Bank.

During the many intervening years since its establishment in 1858 several changes in partnerships have occurred in the Shanghai firm of White & Co., as it is now known, and the name was White & Miller when Mr. H. O. White joined his father in the firm on November 1, 1890, beginning a service now totaling forty-three years. Operating in exchange, bill and bullion brokerage, the firm is a leading factor in its particular field.

Mr. H. O. White was educated at St. Joseph's College, Hongkong.
